Walking. Sometimes it's the only way we get to see things. During the self-guided walking tour you will explore and discover Toronto's market. Start your walking tour at the Metro Toronto Convention Center. Follow this route and visit up to 8 locations of your interest.

1. Market 63 By Coppa - 1 York Street Toronto

2. Sobeys Fort York - 22 Fort York Boulevard Toronto - 1km



3. Metro Liberty Village - 100 Lynn Williams St. Toronto - 3.6km

Built to serve the 46,000 Condo residents surrounding it and renovated in 2015, this 50,278 sq. ft. location uses in-store theatre, artful design and fresh fare to appeal to its local shoppers.



4. *Organic Garage - 42 Hanna Ave, Toronto, ON M6K 1X1 - 3.8km* www.organicgarage.com

This location is the chain's fourth store, and like the rest of the outlets it promises an array of certified organic products, from produce and meats to vitamins and health supplements. Like with the rest of the locations, the Liberty Village store will have biodegradable plastic bags on hand, available for a charge, or you can bring your own reusable bag.

5. *Unboxed Market - 1263 Dundas St W, Toronto - 5km* www.unboxedmarket.com

This market is a waste-free bulk grocery store in Little Portugal. Unboxed goes way, way beyond shelf-stable dry goods, offering fresh produce, eggs, meats, dairy and household products, plus a café and a hot food counter – all without single-use packaging. Products are sold by weight, and shoppers can bring their own containers from home, plunk down a deposit for a mason jar or reusable jug, or, in some cases, opt for a recyclable paper bag.

6. *Loblaws Maple Leaf Gardens - 60 Carlton Street, Toronto - 3km* www.facebook.com/loblaws60carlton

Located inside the hockey shrine where the NHL's Maple Leafs won almost all their Stanley Cups, the Beatles and Elvis Presley performed to screaming girls, and Muhammad Ali fought one of his greatest fights. Four years in the works, the 85,000-square-foot store retains many obvious clues to its hockey history. Plus a few subtle ones.

7. *McEwan - 1 Bloor St E, Toronto - 3.7km* www.mcewangroup.ca/grocery

The 17,000-square-foot subterranean space is a one-stop-shop for all things culinary, offering the busy area's residents and office workers an array of made-to-order dishes, hot and cold food stations, artisanal pantry items and picture-perfect produce where you'll find peeled onions, shallots and spiralized vegetables. There's also an on-site butcher, carving station, sushi station, salad bar and sandwich station. A café and a collection of retail products, including some of chef Mark McEwan's favourite kitchen tools round out the offering.

8. *Eataly - 55 Bloor Street West Toronto - 3.7km* www.eataly.ca

In November 2002, the Eataly concept was born from Oscar Farinetti's idea sketched on a piece of paper. The idea was simple: to gather under one roof high-quality food at sustainable and reasonable prices for ALL, celebrate Italian biodiversity, and create an informal, natural, and simple place to eat, shop, and learn. The name EATALY is a fusion of two words - EAT and ITALY. As a result, Eataly stands for "Eating Italian" which encompasses the history and the food culture of Italy, the ease to prepare its dishes, and the many qualities that Italy has to offer.
